Fact Sheet: (Un)Ethical Partnerships

University of Nottingham's Ethical Policies

- Code of Research Conduct & Research Ethics: Principles include maximising benefit, minimising harm, fairness, integrity, transparency, and respecting autonomy. Criticised for failing to restrict partnerships with arms manufacturers.
- **Ethical Framework**: Governance tool meant to ensure ethical behaviour but inconsistently applied.
- Research & Knowledge Exchange Strategy: Oversees partnerships and compliance but criticised for overlooking human rights issues.
- Concordat on Research Integrity: Commitment to integrity and accountability but undermined by current practices.
- **Dual-Use Export Loopholes**: Allows collaborations where research has both civilian and military uses.

Key Findings

- University collaborates with companies that primarily profit from manufacturing arms, which contradicts its stated ethics which has resulted in complicity in human rights abuses.
- Partnerships with companies supporting Israeli military operations undermine integrity and international law.
- **Greenwashing:** Climate initiatives (e.g., Clean Sky) tied to arms companies such as BAE systems, Leonardo, Rolls Royce, Safran. 93% of the Clean Sky projects benefited arms manufacturers. The updated "Clean Aviation" program that benefits arms manufacturers which UoN is involved in.

Case Studies:

- BAE Systems, Rolls-Royce, Boeing, Leonardo, Safran: All linked to arms production and sales to Israel. These companies are all top arms manufacturers.
- Other partners: Hexagon, Volvo, Allianz, Google DeepMind linked to arms trade, surveillance, or supporting the Israeli military through their technologies. These have also been named in Francesca Albanese's report on companies enabling genocide and apartheid.

UN & experts:

 Multiple UN bodies (ICJ, ICC, HRC, OHCHR, GA) now recognise Israel's actions as plausible genocide, war crimes, crimes against humanity, and an illegal occupation.

- UN experts explicitly warn that states, companies, and institutions may face complicity charges if they continue arms sales, partnerships, or financial support.
- The UN Special Rapporteur (Franscesca Albanese) explains the occupation of Palestine and highlights the ongoing **economy of genocide**, sustained by corporate and financial businesses.
